
40 Years Ago

MY "PIPPY PARK":
Memories of Forty Years Ago

I came to Newfoundland in 1962, at the request of the late Premier Joey Smallwood who was looking for someone to help develop a 400 acre public park to be known as "Confederation Park". It was to consist of the grounds around the newly constructed Confederation Building the newly established campus of Memorial University and the grounds of the College of Trades and Technology that was under construction at that time. It was to include Kents Pond and Long Pond and the land along the yet to be completed Confederation Parkway (now Prince Philip Drive).

In 1966 with the rapid increase in the construction of public and institutional buildings, plans were put in place to expand the area of the park to provide adequate room. Mr Chesley A. Pippy the owner of Newfoundland Tractor and Equipment Co. agreed to donate a large sum of money over a number of years to help establish the

park. In recognition of this pledge, legislation was passed in 1966 naming the park after him.

Joey Smallwood held a public meeting at Gonzaga High School and made the grand announcement asserting that the Provincial Government "...will not

stop until we have here a park that will attract attention across Canada....only one other park will hold a candle to it and that is the one in Regina Saskatchewan (Wascana Centre)...which though attractive is as flat as the floor".

My "Pippy Park" Memories of Forty Years Ago

Mr. Charles R. Bell was named the first Chairman of the Commission in 1966. The legislation formally establishing the Pippy Park Commission was finally passed in 1968. Between 1966 and 1968 I met with Mr. Bell and the other members of the Commission and was instructed to tour Canada and the New England States to gain insight into the development of other comparable large parks. At the same time a firm of Planners was hired to draw up a Master Plan, part of which was based on the reports of my trips.

The draft Master Plan was released in 1969.

In discussing the development of the park over the years Joey Smallwood had specifically told me to find mature trees to plant around the University and Confederation Building. "We don't have time to wait for small trees to grow." I had some doubts as to whether they could survive being relocated to such ex-

posed locations, however to give them the best chance we hired an Ontario firm of tree moving experts from whom we could learn the (then new) techniques involved. Many surplus trees (mostly Beech, Linden and Maples) from the grounds of the Colonial

Building and the old Highways Depot on LeMarchant Road (next to the Grace Hospital) were successfully moved and are still growing today where they were planted. In addition, prior to the construction of the Arts and Culture Centre, which was the prov-

ince's Centennial Project, in 1967 Joey gave specific instructions that the mature trees growing around the old Church of England Boy's Orphanage which then occupied the site, should be preserved at all costs. Those that had to be moved we relocated to form a third line of the avenue leading down to Burtons Pond. These trees were probably 50 or 60 years old at the time but we managed to move them with very few casualties.

During those years it was very satisfying to see the park and the landscapes developing before our eyes. Every year major improvements were visible and we were constantly being congratulated on the transformation that was taking place. It is very encouraging to know that these improvements have continued at a measured pace ever since. I hope we do, in Joey's words, "attract attention across Canada"



Fluvarium Announces Partnership to Upgrade Facility, Programs

Aims to become top Science Centre in Canada focusing on Water Resources

The Quidi Vidi Rennie's River Development Foundation has formed a partnership with longtime corporate supporter Petro Canada to revitalize the Fluvarium.

The Fluvarium, with approximately 3200 square feet of exhibits, provides a panoramic view beneath the surface of Nagle's Hill Brook through nine underwater viewing windows and allows visitors to view fish, insects, and other creatures, as well as plants in their natural environment



in a variety of habitats.

The facility, constructed in 1990, will be renewed to meet current needs and revitalized to better function as a public centre for environmental education.

It is in this building, that the QVRRDF conducts environmental education programs for school students. These curriculum related programs endorsed by the province's Department of Education, are

attended by over 12,000 students annually, from K to Grade 12.

A multi-year project is planned to develop new, innovative, experiential environmental programming and to design, construct and implement exhibits that will achieve program objectives. Each of the Fluvarium exhibit levels will be revitalized

When completed, the Fluvarium aims to become the top science centre in Canada focusing on water resources.
